

High Voltage Policy

To Our Valued Customers,

Since Kenco's inception and for the duration of our business' existence, it has been and will continue to be our standard of practice to <u>not handle high-voltage equipment</u>. The Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA) <u>Standard 1910.333(c)(2)</u> states:

Only qualified persons may work on electric circuit parts or equipment that have not been deenergized under the procedures of paragraph (b) of this section.

By this standard, no Kenco employee is considered a "qualified person." The <u>Texas Health and Safety Code</u> <u>Chapter 752</u> similarly states:

"Authorized person" means an employee of a light and power company, an electric cooperative, or a municipality working on his employer's electric system.

As is clearly communicated in these documents, Kenco is not authorized to deenergize and engage with a line. Similarly, as an example, any employee of one power company, including Edison Electric, PG&E and Xcel Energy, is not authorized to engage with another company's equipment. When Kenco is escorting oversize loads over state lines, careful planning is performed to ensure that all equipment is deenergized by the proper authorized persons.

Each state has statutes similar to the Texas Health and Safety Code accompanied by stiff penalties if not adhered to. As such, the handling of high voltage lines is not and never will be Kenco's responsibility when escorting an oversize load. Kenco will not handle high voltage lines in any of the lower 48 states in which we operate.

We take the safety of our employees, and the proper adherence to all statutes and laws, very seriously, and will only perform the operations that we are trained, certified and authorized to perform.
