Q: What is a typical school day like for you?

I'm really just trying to follow the textbook because if I don't follow through with it, for example, if I miss something from the professor, he wants us to get the answer from the book. So I make sure to have everything ready.

Q: Are classes more difficult now that everything's online?

I think in a sense yes, but I think overall it's a give or take. I wouldn't say that it is exactly harder.

Q: A few other people have told me that their professors have been piling on more homework, is that something you've experienced?

No. I feel like right now my teachers are a lot more flexible with deadlines, but it's also because in my area there's a hurricane.



Q: How is it like being in school with the hurricane?

So if you're in the area with the hurricane, you have deadlines that are pretty flexible which is great. If you have a test coming up but you're in a different time zone, the teachers will give you combinations which is also really great because, for example, I am in Oregon right now. I'm in a different time zone and it is my responsibility to make sure that I get to lectures on time. Overall they're pretty flexible on that.

Q: Is it difficult having to watch lectures and do assignments all in the same place?

I feel like that's a huge detriment since I no longer have a study area. For example, in the apartment I live in, because of COVID, my apartment is supposed to have study areas right in the main lounge that is closed off due to COVID. I can only really study in the kitchen or in my own room or find other places. So me and my friends, we just snuck into one of the study rooms in the university.
