SB98 Crosswalk

In California, Local Education Agencies (LEAs) are required to maintain daily participation and a weekly engagement record for each student receiving instruction through distance learning. LEAs must document daily participation for each student on each instructional day, in whole or in part, for which distance learning is provided. Daily participation is used to track attendance, and may include, but is not limited to any of the following:



Evidence of participation in online activities



Completion of regular assignments



Completion of assessments



Contacts between employees of the LEA and the student or parents/guardians



Other methods of verification determined by LEAs

A student who does not participate in distance learning for at least part of an instructional day is considered as absent for that instructional day. Education Code Section 43504(f) requires each LEA to develop written procedures for tiered reengagement strategies for all pupils who are absent from distance learning for more than three schooldays or 60 percent of the instructional days in a school week. These procedures shall include, but are not limited, to verification of current contact information for each enrolled pupil, daily notification to parents or guardians of absences, a plan for outreach from the school to determine pupil needs including connection line with health and social services as necessary and, when feasible, line transitioning the pupil to full-time in-person instruction.
