



PCCD Overall Course Retention Rates by Race/Ethnicity (Excluding EW/MW)




















- Asian, Hispanic and White increased 4% over the past five years.

- EW/MW Excused Withdrawals were excluded from these charts.





PCCD Overall Course Success Rates by Race/Ethnicity (Excluding EW/MW)




















- African-American, Pacific Islander and Multi-Race gained a range of 13% to 14% increase over the past 5 years.

- EW/MW Excused Withdrawals were excluded from these charts.




PCCD Fall to Spring Persistence by Race/Ethnicity over the Past Five Years












Fall 2019

- Excluding Special Admit (SPX) students, and students who were awarded a degree or certificate within PCCD





Fall to Spring Persistence Rate



**Retention and Success rates excluding EW / MW




Impact of COVID-19 on Excused Withdrawal Requests
